## The Status of Women in New Hampshire, 2015: Highlights

Women in New Hampshire have made considerable advances in recent years but still face inequities that often prevent them from reaching their full potential. Since the 2004 Status of Women in the States report was published, the gender wage gap in New Hampshire has narrowed, a higher percentage of women have bachelor's degrees, and women are more likely to work in managerial or professional occupations. Yet, as in all other states, women in New Hampshire are less likely than men to be in the labor force and more likely to live in poverty. Women also continue to be underrepresented in the state legislature.


If current trends continue, women in New Hampshire will not see equal pay until the year 2082 .*

## Key Findings

- New Hampshire's best grade is in the area of political participation, for which it receives a $\mathrm{B}+$. Its worst grade is in work and family, for which it gets a $\mathrm{D}+$.
- New Hampshire women who work full-time, year-round earn 77 cents on the dollar compared with similarly employed men.
- Approximately 24.6 percent of those working in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields in New Hampshire are women, compared with 28.8 percent nationwide.
- As of 2015, there are no women of color from New Hampshire in the U.S. Congress.

- Women in New Hampshire who are unionized earn \$214 more per week, on average, than those who are not represented by a union.
- Approximately 35.6 percent of women in New Hampshire have a bachelor's degree or higher, an increase of about 9 percentage points since 2000.
- In 2012-2013, 12.3 percent of New Hampshire's four-year-olds were enrolled in state pre-K, preschool special education, or state and federal Head Start.
- Heart disease is the biggest killer of women in the United States. New Hampshire ranks 17 of 51 with a mortality rate of 117.4 per 100,000.
