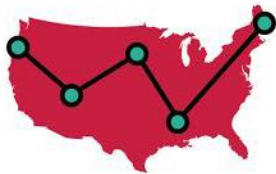

The Status of Women in Connecticut, 2015: Highlights

Women in Connecticut have made considerable advances in recent years but still face inequities that often prevent them from reaching their full potential. Since the 2004 *Status of Women in the States* report was published, the gender wage gap in Connecticut has narrowed, a higher percentage of women have bachelor's degrees, and women are more likely to work in managerial or professional occupations. Yet, as in all other states, women in Connecticut are less likely than men to be in the labor force and more likely to live in poverty. Women also continue to be underrepresented in the state legislature.



If current trends continue, women in Connecticut will not see equal pay until the year **2061**.*



Women hold **28.3%** of seats in the state legislature.

Key Findings

- Connecticut's best grade is in the area of reproductive rights, for which it receives an A-. Its worst grades are in political participation and work and family, for which it gets a C.
- Connecticut women who work full-time, year-round earn 77 cents on the dollar compared with similarly employed men.
- Approximately 30.2 percent of those working in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields in Connecticut are women, compared with 28.8 percent nationwide.
- As of 2015, there is one woman of color in statewide elective executive office in Connecticut, and no women of color from the state in the U.S. Congress.
- Women in Connecticut who are unionized earn \$275 more per week, on average, than those who are not represented by a union.
- Approximately 37.4 percent of women in Connecticut have a bachelor's degree or higher, an increase of about 8 percentage points since 2000.
- In 2012–2013, 25.9 percent of Connecticut's four-year-olds were enrolled in state pre-K, preschool special education, or state and federal Head Start.
- Heart disease is the biggest killer of women in the United States. Connecticut ranks 21 of 51 with a mortality rate of 121.9 per 100,000.
